REPORT DETAIL

BACKGROUND

At the February 2025 Ordinary Meeting of Council, a report was presented to Council outlining the background and process undertaken to develop draft masterplans for the three (3) sporting precincts; Centenary oval, Kirton point and Ravendale, as identified as an action from the Sports and Recreation Strategy 2023-2027.

Upon consideration of the drafts and the supporting information detailed within the body of the report, Council resolved as per the below.

CO 25/037 Moved: Councillor Cowley Seconded: Deputy Mayor Rowsell

That Council:

- 1. Receive the draft master plans for the Centenary Oval, Kirton Point and Ravendale Sporting Precincts (with minor amendments);
- 2. Endorse the release of the draft master plans (with minor amendments) for public consultation via 'Your Say' for a period of four weeks (28 days); and
- 3. Request a further report to Council summarising the feedback received during the consultation process and recommendation to Council on the adoption of the draft plans as final.

CARRIED

CONSULTATION PROCESS

The 3 draft sports precincts masterplans were released for public consultation in alignment with Council's Public Consultation & Community Engagement Policy via:

• The "Your Say" platform on Council's website for 28 days with associated public promotion of the opportunity to provide feedback on the draft plan by completing an on-line submission or written letter to Council.

The public consultation period commenced 10 April 2025 and closed on 9 May 2025, during which fourteen (14) submissions were made.

SUMMARY OF FEEDBACK

As detailed within the report presented to Council in February, the process to establish the draft masterplans included several group and independent sessions and opportunities for feedback for all identified stakeholder groups across the 3 sporting precincts. This was reflected in the feedback received, meaning there was little to no negative feedback, and where the feedback was received by existing stakeholders it was in support of the masterplans.

A larger percentage of the submissions received were in representation of the needs of basketball within the community, and seeking consideration of covered multi-use facilities at the Ravendale Sporting Precinct amongst requests for consideration for basketball facilities across the broader city.

CONCLUSIONS


Upon review of the feedback received and with consideration of the consultation that occurred throughout the drafting of the masterplans, it is being recommended to Council that the draft plans be adopted by Council as final plans. However, minor amendments to the Ravendale Sporting Precinct Masterplan are being recommended, which would be made to reflect the level of advocacy from the basketball community to ensure the plan sets intentions for a mixed-use arrangement being negotiated as part of any future projects to redevelop or cover the existing netball courts where practicable. Earlier conversations with the Port Lincoln Netball Association indicate that there is a willingness towards such a proposal, so much so that it could have reasonably been included into the drafts prior to consultation.

The adoption of these plans will provide guidance to the administration with respect to Council's priorities and strategic direction for each of the sporting precincts, broaden prospects for future grant funding to continue to invest in the City's sporting facilities and see Council's values embedded within future approval of development at the sites.

Project Overview

The City of Port Lincoln invited community feedback on the Draft Centenary Oval, Kirton Point and Ravendale Sporting Precincts Master Plans from Thursday 10 April to Friday 9 May 2025. Developed in collaboration with local sporting groups and key stakeholders, these master plans provide a strategic framework to guide future projects at each precinct to enhance key sporting facilities to meet the needs of our community.

As part of the City's Sport and Recreation Strategy 2023-2027, adopted in February 2023, the development of these Master Plans was identified as a key strategic initiative to help Council and local sporting organisations prioritise investment in sporting and recreation infrastructure and to create a clear vision for each precinct. These Master Plans will be integral in supporting future grant applications and ensuring a more coordinated approach to facility upgrades, reducing the risk of piecemeal investment.

The proposed upgrades within the Master Plans aim to deliver high-quality, inclusive, and fit-for-purpose facilities that cater to both competitive and recreational users, that can be delivered separately over many years as funding becomes available.

The draft Master Plans propose a range of short, medium, and long-term projects across the three precincts:

Centenary Oval Precinct

- Short-term: Oval lighting upgrade, irrigation replacement, turf upgrade, new walking trail, exercise station, entry plaza upgrade
- Medium-term: New change rooms/canteen, player surface and lighting upgrade, village green improvements
- Long-term: Grandstand and carpark upgrades, artificial pitch, future land use opportunities

Kirton Point Sporting Precinct (including Kirton and Poole Ovals)

- Short-term: Lighting upgrade, future change facilities
- Medium-term: New change rooms/canteen, calisthenics building refurbishment, improved facility connections and shared facility opportunities
- Long-term: Grandstand and carpark upgrades, turf renovation, new parking and line marking

On behalf of the Southern Eyre South Cricket Club, we appreciate the opportunity to provide input regarding the planning and development of the Centenary Oval, Kirton Point, and Ravendale sporting precincts. As a key stakeholder in local sport and community engagement, we write to stress the importance of maintaining and enhancing turf wicket facilities within the City of Port Lincoln.

Turf wickets offer a unique playing surface for our local cricketers that synthetic alternatives cannot replicate. They are essential for player development, ensuring our cricketers—especially junior and emerging talent—gain experience on surfaces comparable to those used at representative and elite levels. Our club alone had more than 10 junior cricketers represent our region over in Adelaide this season, playing cricket exclusively on turf wickets. These junior cricketers would be at a huge disadvantage if there was no turf pitch.

Southern Eyre South Cricket Club has long contributed to the local cricketing landscape by fostering sportsmanship, community connection, and youth engagement. To continue this role, access to a high-quality turf wicket within Port Lincoln is vital. With the growing popularity of cricket across genders and age groups, we must provide facilities that meet both current and future demand. The current curator is a member of our club.

We respectfully urge the City to:

- 1. Prioritise the inclusion and long-term maintenance of a turf wicket in the final planning for Centenary Oval, Kirton Point, or Ravendale, ideally aligned with club and association needs.
- 2. Ensure that facility developments remain in consultation with local cricket stakeholders to reflect community use, sporting requirements, and heritage value.
- 3. Recognise the importance of turf wickets in attracting regional competitions, tournaments, and representative matches to Port Lincoln, contributing to the local economy and regional pride.

4. Encourage council to support the maintenance and upkeep of the turf wicket through financial contributions.
